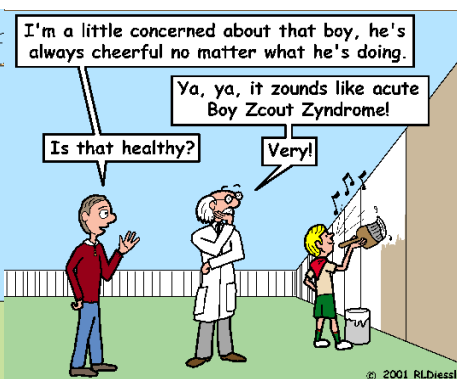
making this a wonderful year in Kawida Lodge.

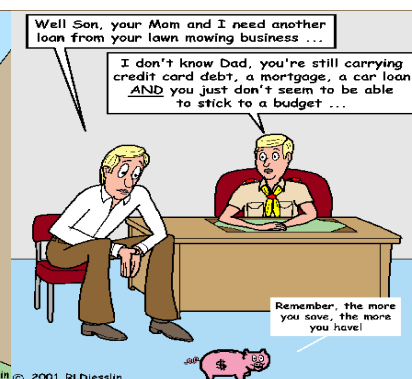

"I Just Like to Scout": A Tribute to Our Lodge

January 1st, 2012 marks a changing of the guard for Kawida Lodge. As you may have heard, Mr. Alan Watts is stepping down from his long held position of Lodge Adviser (2007-2011) and handing the reins to Dr. Doug Vick. Mr. Watts is the second longest running Lodge Adviser in Kawida's history, and, even though he is stepping down as Lodge Adviser, it is important to remember that neither he nor Mama Watts is leaving Kawida Lodge by any means. Look forward to seeing the Wattses (and brownies) at many future lodge events to come!

I first remember meeting Mr. Watts when I went through my ordeal in 2007. The Order of the Arrow was a strange, new world for me, and to top it off there was this funny looking man with the biggest beard I'd ever seen outside of a movie talking to my ordeal class about what the OA was. I was a little intimidated by my first meeting with Mr. Watts. This impression changed at my next lodge event, Fall Fellowship.

Mr. Watts still had a big beard, but now he was sporting a banjo and Lodge Adviser Minutes (or five). At Fall Fellowship, he really made Kawida Lodge a welcoming place to me, and has continued to do so even since and for everything Arrowman, old and new, that's a part of Kawida Lodge (and even quite a few others who aren't members).

If I was asked to list some of my role models, Mr. Watts would definitely be near the top of that list. In my life, there have been few others as selfless and con-

siderate as Mr. Watts. Whenever, he is asked about the successes of Kawida Lodge, he always passes the credit onto its youth saying "I'm just the adviser". If Mr. Watts asked why he is so involved with the BSA and OA, he often simply responds with "I just like to Scout." If an Arrowman needed a ride to Conclave or Council-of-Chiefs or another far away event, Mr. Watts would volunteer to swing by and pick that Arrowman up, even if it meant going out of his way. One of his mantra's is "The youth come first" and, especially with the past and present Lodge Officers, as Lodge Adviser he has been dedicated to helping Kawida's youth do the best they can in OA.

A few of his additional services to scouting include: becoming an Eagle Scout in 1972, serving as Troop 58's Scoutmaster from 1995-2004, serving on Blue Grass Council's Executive Board and serving as the current Cubmaster for Pack 58. Mr. Watts has received the Scoutmaster's Key, the Blue Grass Council President's Award, the Silver Beaver, God and Service Award, District Award of Merit, OA Vigil Honor, OA Founders Award, the William "Bud" Tobin Award, the Lodge Chief's Citation and others.

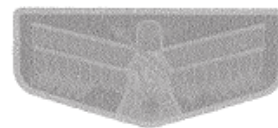

I cannot forget all the adult members and advisers who have worked along with me to insure the youth succeed. It has been my pleasure to work with you and I will miss the fellowship from everyone.

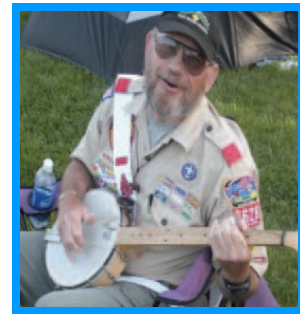
